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Pray for Tonga Community needs water, food, shelter



Trouble in paradise ... the recent volcanic eruption has devastated the Tongan coast line and left the country blanketed in ash

TONGA is in desperate need of food, water and shelter after a devastating tsunami destroyed miles of coastline, homes and infrastructure. An underwater volcano erupted on January 15, causing the tsunami and shrouding the islands in ash.

Australia and New Zealand have responded with flights and naval vessels carrying relief supplies.

But Tonga's churches have warned that people will need psychological support as they come to terms with the enormity of the damage and loss. Tonga has a strong disaster chaplaincy network which has worked efficiently and successfully in the past.

Pacific Conference of Churches General Secretary, Reverend James Bhagwan, called on the ecumenical family to keep Tonga in their prayers and support the relief effort if possible.

Cash donations can be made to the Free Wesleyan Church in Tonga or the National Council of Churches. Communications with the kingdom remain patchy and efforts are being made to restore links as soon as possible.

Towards the end of last year, the PCC Asset Management Unit carried out the initial phase of its Cyclone Preparedness work by cleaning gutters and repairing roofs on the five commercial and four rental properties.

This included the construction of new cyclone shutters for all properties with a special emphasis on ease of installation.. The second phase of maintenance begins in the last week of January.

The reality of COVID-19 travel For a moment it looked like Olivia Baro would not see her family until after

For a moment it looked like Olivia Baro would not see her family until after Christmas.

A day after arriving in Geneva for a meeting with the World Council of Churches, the Omricon Variant of the Corona Virus was identified and countries started to close their borders. What usually is a routine Geneva-London-Hong Kong-Nadi flight was no longer a possibility. The Pacific Conference of Churches Administration Team scrambled to find options but it appeared like there would be no more airports through which Olivia could travel.

Our friends at the WCC were eager to put Olivia up and she could work on-line for the forseeable future - but what of her husband, Keni, and daughter Eci? When it seemed all hope was lost, an opportunity arose. A flight from Geneva to Helsinki to Hong Kong - the one major hub through which flights were available direct to Fiji. The bookings were made, COVID-19 tests and quarantine facilities arranged and then Olivia began the long haul back to Fiji, arriving a few days later than expected.

After three days in quarantine, she was out just in time to attend the office end of the year bash.

Over the years we've had staff stranded all over the world for weeks on end due to flight disruptions, visa changes, political upheavals, but never before due to a global pandemic,

Of course, we're happy Olivia is home and safe with her family. Unfortunately, travel restrictions mean that intern, Petero Lalagavivi, is unable to fly to Geneva. But a staff member at home is worth two stuck on the other side of the world.
